Superintendent Donna Colosky welcomed the members to the new committee and they introduced themselves.

Donna reviewed the MISD Superintendent Focus Priorities, noting that the Class of 2031 have now entered kindergarten.

**Teaching and Learning priorities:** Professional Learning Multi-Tier Systems of Support Inclusive and equitable child centered education for each student

## Monitoring and administration priorities:

Fundamental Monitoring Fiscally Sustainable Funding Human Resources Facilities, including evaluating current facilities for future planning

Four new Superintendent Advisories have been created: Superintendent Equity Advisory Council Superintendent Community Advisory Superintendent Teaching and Learning Advisory Superintendent Student Advisory

The Highly Capable and Special Education programs have undergone reviews.

School Board strategic planning: The Board is undertaking a review/update of Board Policy 2020 this year.

## Capital Projects/Facilities Update – Ty Bergstrom

A survey has been done to evaluate the status of current facilities for capacity and future planning, and safety and security for students and staff.

Mercer Island High School received a new roof in summer 2018. New directed lighting on the field at the stadium was installed over the summer.

The District is studying potential improvements to Mary Wayte Pool, including potentially replacing the boiler system. Work was done last year to reline the pipes at the pool.

Planning is underway for a new secure front entrance/vestibule at the high school, with construction anticipated in spring 2019.

## Education Funding/MISD Budget Overview

Ty Bergstrom reviewed the actions taken by the state Legislature last spring. The prototypical school model remained the same But while the state granted more funds to districts, at same the it cut local levies. MISD settled a two-year contract with MIEA.

The law enacted in the wake of the McCleary ruling defines local funding as local enrichment dollars, but doesn't make clear what enrichment means. Districts are required to create new budgets that makes assumptions four years out.

Safety Net - Districts are allowed to apply for funds to reimburse large special education costs, typically get back 10 percent or so.

Transportation funding – Districts will be receiving some additional funding for the transportation portion of those salaries.

Foundation/PTA support - Mercer Island is trying to be less dependent on that funding for salaries.

Enrollment - This year about 40 less student than last year in kindergarten. But there is growth in pre-K special ed. The District is projecting relatively flat enrollment for the next four years.

Potential for staffing and other cost reductions The bottom line is that MISD is now deficit spending like many districts. Still seeking clarity on state funding and enrollment and what reductions if any would be needed going forward. Ty shared budget figures for the next four years, with decreasing fund balances.

Legislative issues to be discussed in the 2019 session beginning in January include: The new State Employees Benefits Board Class size reduction Special education costs and potentially more funding.
